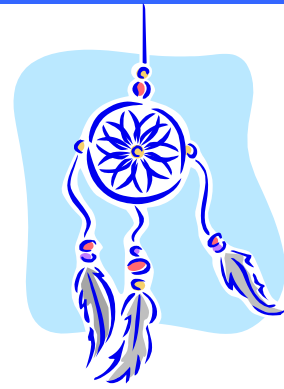


University of California Native American Professional Development Conference (NAPDC)



August 10-11, 2008
University of California, Los Angeles

The conference is designed to provide the tools, resources, and professional development guidance to help advance your career in the UC system. The [agenda](#) includes speakers and presenters from within and outside the UC system, as well as opportunities to meet Native staff from other campuses and to help build a network of advocates and advisors.

The conference includes:

- An opening dinner with a featured keynote on Sunday
- A day of professional development workshops
- Lunch on Monday
- Opportunities for social and professional networking
- Parking (if staying in the residence hall accommodations)

This is a first of a kind system wide initiative and we are hoping to see at least 2 participants from each campus. Although priority will be given to student affairs staff, the conference is open to staff from other administrative areas, as well. We encourage supervisors to support requests for release time to attend the conference.

The Vice Chancellors of Student Affairs in the UC have agreed to be the collection point of the registration fee for their respective campuses (conference registration cost will be about \$175 per person and, if staying in the residence halls, the full cost will be \$285 for single or \$240 for double occupancy). Individual departments will be responsible for transportation, non-conference meals and off-campus hotel costs.
